




Term	Definition	Image
<b>Arthritis</b>	A health problem where a person's joints become stiff, swollen and/or painful to move.	
<b>Cerebral palsy</b>	A group of conditions that affect movement, muscle tone, balance and posture. Cerebral palsy is a result of damage to the brain before, during or soon after birth.	
<b>Grab bar</b>	A fixed bar for a person to hold onto for assistance balancing or moving.	
<b>Permanent ramp</b>	A smooth surface that bridges a gap between two levels and is fixed in place. It may include hand rails at the sides. They can be built straight or with turns.	
<b>Portable ramp</b>	A moveable, sloping surface that bridges a gap between two levels.	
<b>Ramp ratio</b>	Ramp ratio describes how steep a ramp is. For example, 1:8. A ratio of 1:8 means that for every 1cm of height, the ramp length grows 8cm along the ground.	
<b>Threshold</b>	A rise at the bottom of a doorway or entrance to a building or room. It is usually made of wood, metal, plastic or stone.	
<b>Twin track ramp</b>	Two separate narrow tracks for the front and back wheels of four-wheel wheelchairs.	
<b>Wide platform ramp</b>	A single platform which is wide enough for a person who is using a wheelchair or a walking aid.
